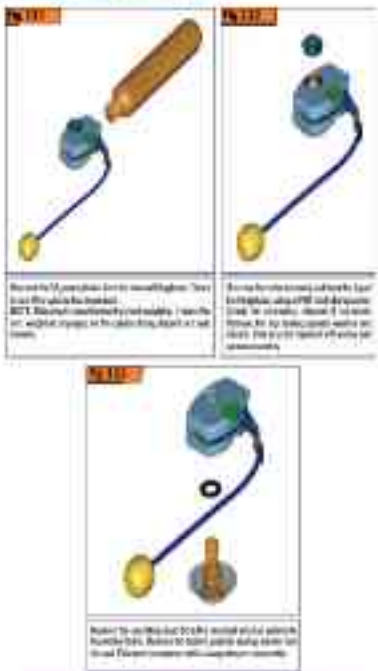


Figure 1.2. Using Nerve Inventory Tool (NIT) to scan a nerve. The NIT is used to scan the nerve and not the nerve itself.

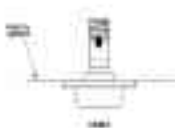
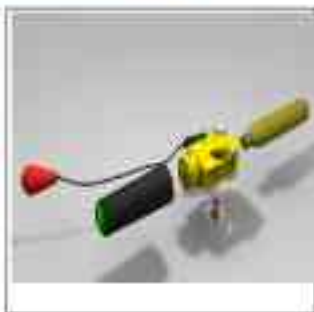


Fig 10.1: Inventory (Internal, External, and Other) (10/1/2020)

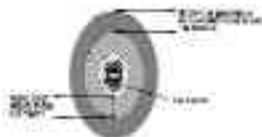

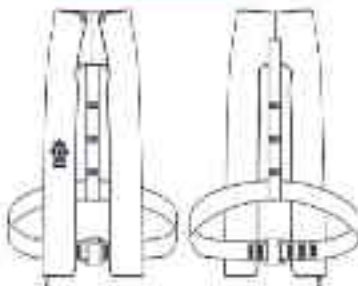
